How to Tie a Shoe & Other Big Adventures is the first book in a series of Penny Candy Handbooks—our take on the old how-to guide—that focus, oh-so-poetically, on exploration and adventure in everyday life. Skip Hill's black-and-white illustrations are so intricate and brimming with personality that readers will spend minutes on each page soaking in the detail. And the story itself? Well, to quote from it, "If you've ever eaten spaghetti or pointed out a bird's nest to a friend in spring or combed your hair after sleeping hard on your head, you can probably tie a shoe!"

Finally, for National Poetry Month, we have a real treat. We've paired Gertrude Stein's poem "A Little Called Pauline" with Bianca Stone's illustrations for an indelible journey into the world of a little girl named Pauline who lives with her mom in a house on stilts by the sea—and gets herself into a little trouble when she steals a boat and goes on an adventure. Stein's weird, sometimes confusing, language play and Stone's signature poetry-comics style are a wild and beautiful ride into the minds of not one, but two poets! Bianca writes a wonderful afterword to

A Little Called Pauline about using imagination to let Stein's words tell a new story.

Finally, revisit our Fall 2019 books about teamwork and taking risks, a transgender kid's experience coming out to his family, a hopeful take on a folktale about the nature of life and death, and a story involving lassoing the clouds that embodies imaginative grieving. Our backlist might still be small, but it is mighty and populated with books that matter and that can start conversations with kids.
